


- You should have received an email from the Human Trafficking Summit asking you to create a new password





- Click ok




- You will be redirected to log in



State Human Trafficking Laws Nationwide: Promising Practices

Every state has enacted laws criminalizing human trafficking. But state laws can vary greatly in how they define who is a "trafficker," what constitutes coercion, what protections and remedies victims are offered, and how child sex trafficking victims are identified and cared for. This session will examine promising legal approaches being pioneered by U.S. states and will highlight some of the most innovative current state practices.

Professor Terry Coonan, J.D.
Executive Director, Center for the Advancement of Human Rights, Florida State University (FSU)

Professor Coonan is the executive director of the FSU Center for the Advancement of Human Rights and an associate professor in the FSU College of Criminology and Criminal Justice. Professor Coonan has been a member of the Statewide Council on Human Trafficking since its inception in 2014. He has done leading work nationally on human trafficking, designing, and delivering trainings for the U.S. Department of Justice, the Florida Office of the Attorney General, and numerous other agencies. Professor Coonan has also done extensive work training state judges throughout the country. Since 2004, he has worked closely with the Florida Legislature in designing Florida's anti-trafficking statutes.
